Part Worn Tyres – Should We Purchase Used Tires?



You may have noticed roadside posters offering <u>used tires</u> and thought, "What are they exactly?" Some people see them as a quick and inexpensive option to have their automobile fitted with new tyres, while others see them as too unsafe even to attempt.

"Part-worn tyres" means precisely what it sounds like: previously used tyres. Part worn tyres are often sold by scrap merchants or other sources that deal with used automobiles or write-offs since they are a convenient method for these businesses to make a little more money.

A tyre one person considers safe may be deadly to another since opinions on what makes a salvageable tyre vary widely. Part-worn tyres are the legal equivalent of purchasing a used electrical appliance; if there is a problem, you have no recourse, and if you are involved in an accident that can be directly linked to the installation of part-worn tyres, you have no legal recourse to seek compensation.

Why Settle For Part Worn Tyres (Used Tires)?



Used tyres should only be purchased for financial reasons. It's a relatively safe option to buy if you know the history of the tyres you're looking at (maybe a buddy has some track day rubber they no longer need, for example), but you probably won't know what kind of history comes with a partially worn tyre. When shopping for used tires, remember that the quality control standards of different retailers will vary widely. Regarding things like worn sidewalls and flat treads, some people won't care as much as others.

If you're set on using partially worn tyres anyhow, you should choose a <u>well-known brand</u>, so you know the tyre's foundation is built to last. Theoretically, if you put two identical tyres on an axle, they should wear evenly. It is improbable that you will locate a single tyre similar to the other three on your automobile in terms of tread wear if you need to replace one.

Warning Signs of Part Worn Tyres:

#1 - The Deterioration Of Tyre Treads:



The most important item to check is the tread's wear. Assuming it has yet to be driven on much, a nearly new tyre should last you quite a while. However, if the shoulders are worn or the tread is uneven, you will have to spend more money in a few months when your car fails its MoT due to worn tyres.

New tyres have 8 millimetres of tread, but stores and safety groups advise changing them to 3 millimetres. A tyre with less tread than this is useless, and one with more tread than this that isn't worn uniformly throughout the tyre isn't any better.

#2 - The Sidewalls Of Tyres Were Slashed:



If the tread is in good shape, the sidewalls should be examined. There is a good chance that the tyres were damaged in the accident if they were removed from a vehicle that had been in one (again, how do you know whether they had or not?). The sidewall could have been damaged by the bodywork touching the tyre or by forces from the side.

Lousy parking is a sure way to ruin your tyres' sidewalls. Always check the tyre's interior for a consistent appearance to the inside area of the sidewall to see if any cuts, scratches, or loose rubber might indicate damage to the tyre's structure.

#3 - Tyre Servicing:



There is also the matter of mended tyres. A rubber plug may be used to repair a tyre punctured by a nail, screw, or other objects, preventing air loss.

Even though patching a punctured tread is perfectly acceptable, doing so damages the belts that hold the tyres in place. Some tyres can't be mended at all, and even the ones that can lower their top speed rating. A second look should be taken at the tyre's inner structure for signs of deterioration. If you're being thorough, you should generally avoid tyres with any form of damage, whether on the inside or the outside.

- 5. Examine the tread depth and check for uneven wear.
- 6. Inspect the tyre carcass for any damage or repairs.
- 7. If in doubt, wait to purchase.
