

Hand Sanitizer and Disinfecting Wipes

Leaving out a few extra cleaning supplies may help your guests feel more comfortable and in control of their space.

Vacant Drawers

It's off-putting for visitors to find the guest room closet and dresser bursting with your overflow clothing. Leave at least two free drawers (set ajar so it's clear that they're for guest use), ample hanging space, and a half-dozen hangers to stow belongings.

Air Freshener

Keep a room deodorizer on hand to combat mustiness or cover up a bad smell (quick). Or consider a natural-oil diffuser with a subtle scent, like lavender or eucalyptus.

A Cozy Rug

A plush covering (on a wood floor or on top of a carpet) softens the space and makes the room feel cozy. Choose a durable, stain-resistant material, like wool.

Electric Fan

If you have a ceiling fan to keep the space from getting stuffy, great. If not, pick up an electric table fan. Before guests arrive, make sure it works and clean the blades.

Carafe of Water and a Glass

Keep the vessel freshly filled to prevent guests from having to hunt, opening and closing cupboards, when middle-of-the-night thirst strikes.

Spare Key

Without one, guests are less comfortable coming and going as they please. Leave the key on a tray on the nightstand, along with a note detailing any tricky locks or alarms.

Covered Waste Can

It's inevitable that guests will accumulate trash. A covered can lets them toss litter without having to look at it. Instead of a version with a lift-off lid, choose a step can—it's easier and more sanitary.

Luggage Rack

Their suitcases have been dragged through a plane or a train or stuffed in a car trunk. Do you really want them opened on top of the duvet? A rack is more convenient.

Extra Toilet Paper (and a Plunger)

Place these in an obvious place in the bathroom.... because no visitor wants to ask!

Clean Towels

Leaving a stack of fluffy towels on the bed or in the bathroom signals to your guests that they're free to use the shower, without having to ask. Bonus points: If your shower is particularly difficult to operate, consider leaving out some brief instructions.

Extra Credit

Fresh Flowers

They're the best way to make a space welcoming. Just put mildly scented grocery store blooms in a vase that's out of the way and not tippable, in case guests are getting ready in a hurry.

WiFi Password

Bonus points: Print it on card stock, have it laminated at an office-supply shop, and place it on the nightstand so that guests can find it at a glance.

Reading Material

Two to three current issues of newsy or general lifestyle magazines or a small stack of books (short stories, poetry, and essays) are a nice touch for lounging.

Comfy Slippers

Leave a pair or two next to the bed so visitors don't have to walk around in socks (or barefoot).

Charging Station

Leave one on the nightstand so guests can power up if they forgot theirs at home (or just don't feel like digging around in the suitcase for it). Consider a universal phone charger that'll work for iPhones and Androids.

TV/Remote Instructions

It's much easier to provide printed steps. Include a list of crowd-pleasing channels (CNN, E!, ESPN) for quick reference.

Hamper

It's so much nicer to have a spot for stashing dirty clothes other than a suitcase, especially for guests staying more than a few days.

Steamer

A space-saving alternative to the iron and board for smoothing blouses and button-downs.

Motion-Sensor Light

Any nightlight en route to the bathroom is appreciated, but a motion-sensor version lets you keep the house nice and dark when it's not needed. It's low-cost and a cinch to install, too.

Room-Darkening Curtains

Light-blocking drapes are a godsend for late risers.

Snack Station



A small basket or jar of snacks lets midnight snacking happen without them feeling awkward about asking you.

Extra Pillows and Blankets

Take the guessing game out of prepping a bed by supplying overnight guests with ample blankets and pillows so they can customize their sleep space to their liking.

Clock Radio

Sure, they'll probably use their phone, but a clock radio may give them another option for listening to music (or checking the time in the middle of the night).

3. How to Decorate Your House at Christmas

Decorating a house in anticipation of Christmas is almost as fun as opening presents on Christmas morning. Traditional Decorations

Tie a small red ribbon over the hook to make it look more festive. And of course, encourage people to give each other a kiss if they find themselves standing beneath the mistletoe together.

Hang some lights elsewhere around the house. Hang some lights at the top borders of walls where the ceiling meets the wall. If possible and if you have enough lights to do it, strand up some lights around the room you will be presenting most of the Christmas festivities in Perth.

Set Up a Christmas Village, if you have a few Christmas Village houses to present to people. These houses have become a symbol of old time and years past and a representation of what Christmases gone by have been like.

Display a manger someplace inside the Christmas festivities room or near the Christmas tree. You may want to include baby Jesus before (if you are afraid of losing him to the original box or forgetting to place him in the cradle later), but that can be left up to you to decide.

Decorate some of the other rooms in your house. Hang more ornaments with paperclips on nails and screws that are only used during Christmas. Make things festive inside the house.

Set up a Christmas tree in a child's room, if you can be assured that they will not try to mess or play with it, or break it in any way. Some tweens and early teenagers can be trusted to not break the ornaments.

Display some of the Christmas cards as they arrive. Use some of supporting banisters and windows to hang the cards.

Set out any entryway doormats inside or outside that have a festive Christmas theme (if any special ones are present).

Set up a festive Christmas table centerpiece table setting and table (drapes).

Get some Christmas music ready to be played in stereo. Prepare some CD's or cassettes, or find stations on the computer that play solely Christmas music. But before we begin, like any task, you need to have the right tools to ensure a safe and proper set-up. This includes cotton gloves for shaping branches (and to prevents scratches), scissors for materials, packaging and equipment, and a sturdy ladder or step stool for installing toppers and arranging decorations on taller trees.

So now you're prepped, fancy getting that Insta-worthy look with very little effort? Read on for tips from the pros...

1. Invest in a high-quality tree

Artificial Christmas trees crafted from premium materials provide sturdy and reliable support for decorations. You'll find that high-quality trees are generally more durable and can stand up to repeated use year after year, all while maintaining its beautiful look.

Opt for a traditional tree rather than a trend-led one so that it doesn't go 'out of date' after a few years, plus a traditional design gives you the perfect base to layer and decorate as you wish.

Pre-lit Christmas trees are a firm household favourite because it saves time in untangling all those lights, however, a benefit of buying an unlit tree is that you can choose whatever style of lights you want. When it comes to size, 7ft Christmas trees in Perth are now extremely popular but you should always choose a tree that fits in your space and doesn't leave it feeling too cramped. If you're tight on space, there are some great slim Christmas trees on the market, including narrow pencil designs, which may be a better fit. And remember, to prevent wear and tear on your Christmas tree, consider models with advanced features that offer easy set up and storage.

Alternatively, if you want a real Christmas tree, there's a great selection available to buy from tree farms, markets or online stores. See all the tree varieties available, including Nordmann Fir and Norway Spruce, in our real Christmas tree guide.

2. Fluff and shape branches

Fluffing the branches helps to make your artificial Christmas tree look fuller and more natural. This can be a very time-consuming task, but trust us, the end result is more than worth it. Gloves (and a long-sleeve top) will serve you well here, helping to avoid any scrapes and grazes on your hand and arms, as the branches can be spiky.

To begin, separate each branch so they fan out to cover as much area as possible, and don't hesitate to bend individual branches to fill in gaps. A properly shaped tree is an appealing sight, however minimal or lavish your embellishments may be.

3. Design around a theme

A professional-looking Christmas tree has a central look that ties the decorations together. Deciding on a theme before choosing your decorations sets the tone and gives you a clear idea of how to decorate your tree. Need some inspiration? Why not take a look at John Lewis' Christmas themes this year – from Dawn & Dusk to Trinket & Treasure, there are four key looks to help you decorate this festive season.

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4. Choose the right colours (and materials)

Once you've decided on your theme, curate a colour palette to bring it to life. For example, for a traditional yet opulent look stick to a red, green and gold, for a Scandi vibe layer shades of white and soft neutrals, or choose blue and silver for an icy cool aesthetic. Stick to two (definitely no more than three) colours to keep the look contained rather than cluttered. Also think about materials and texture: plush velvet baubles are perfect for a luxe tree, while paper and wooden decorations are ideal for any Nordic-inspired, rustic or even minimalist trees.

Less is always more but it is Christmas after all, so above anything else, decorate your tree in whatever way makes you happy! The decorating rulebook is certainly relaxed at Christmastime, so have fun with it.



5. Start with the lights first

While pre-lit Christmas trees are popular and will save you time (and money), you'll need Christmas tree lights if you have a plain tree. As a general rule of thumb, the lighting experts at Lights4fun advise 100 bulbs or 5 metres of lights per 2ft of Christmas tree. So for a 6ft tree, you'd need 300 bulbs or 15 metres of lights.

The first, most important thing you need to do when decorating your Christmas tree is to always add the lights first – it's more difficult to do this after you've added decorations like baubles and garlands.

The experts at Balsam Hill suggest using the plug as the starting point, wrapping the lights around your Christmas tree's trunk, and working your way up from the centre of the base of

your tree. Continue wrapping the lights evenly around the branches nearest to the trunk, and then weave it upwards from the middle of the crown.

'When you reach the crown, weave your way back down, arranging the lights further out on the branches,' Balsam Hill advise. 'Keep weaving the lights until you reach the tips of the branches.'

And remember, when weaving, the bulb should be positioned under a branch and the next bulb over a branch, and so forth.

6. Balance the decor

Given the many Christmas tree decorations you're likely to have, you have to ensure that everything is well-balanced and spread out to your liking. Always start at the top: arrange embellishments from the top of the tree and then work towards the bottom. This way, you can easily check your design as you dress up your tree.

7. Cluster your baubles

Balsam Hill's design consultant, Brad Schmidt, recommends clustering three baubles of different sizes to add flair and visual appeal. You can either put the same pieces together or choose contrasting ones.

The White Company echo this suggestion – to create a balanced, visually pleasing tree, buy baubles in threes, sixes, or twelves, and add these on first in a 'Z' shape. You should hang larger baubles closer to the centre of the tree to give it more depth, and use smaller ones towards the end of the branches.

Dangle delicate glass baubles at the top of the tree to prevent any breakages, and add special ones last to ensure they are in the perfect position.

Dry floral foam

- Knife
- 4- to 6-inch-high brass bowl
- Hot glue gun, glue sticks
- Ruler
- Evergreen bough
- 14 Christmas ornament balls
- 12 small pinecones
- 1 spray of plums (or about 7 plums)
- 4 berry sprays, cut into pieces
- 3 poinsettia flowers with leaves
- To create an ornament centerpiece:

Cut floral foam to fit the bowl; glue. (Use a plastic liner if you don't want to glue bowl.) Cut bough into five- to six-inch lengths. Form width and length by gluing greens around edge of container.

Mound Christmas ornaments, pinecones, plums, and berry sprays on the greens and floral foam and secure with hot glue.

Glue sprigs of greens, poinsettia flowers, and other poinsettia leaves to fill in holes between ornaments and pinecones.

Any event planner or caterer will tell you the key to a successful party is planning. It's not enough to simply make a few dishes and send invitations. A little advance planning saves you time and headaches later so spend five or ten minutes envisioning the party and walking yourself through as a guest. When party time comes, both you and your guests will have a night to remember!

Dreaming of the Perfect Party



The holiday season is packed with parties, so it's a good idea to send invitations three weeks in advance. The sooner you send your invitations, the less likely it is that your guests will have committed to another event. Your invitations should state the starting and ending time of your party and should mention the food you will be serving, whether it is light holiday fare or a traditional sit-down dinner. And don't forget to include directions!

Choose a menu for which many of the items can be made ahead of time. Some appetizers and desserts can be made and frozen several weeks in advance. Other recipes can be mixed together a few days before and stored in the refrigerator. Simply bake and finish the day of the party. Remember that parties aren't the time to try a new recipe. Either test a new menu item before the party, or stick with tried-and-true recipes.

Opt for heavy finger foods instead of recipes that require dinnerware. Foods that can be eaten without a fork and knife keep spills and dribbles down, and they reduce the amount of dishwashing you have to do later. If you do serve dishes that require dinnerware, make sure you have table seating for guests to sit down and eat. Make it easy on yourself. If you dread cleanup, opt for nice plasticware that can be tossed in the trash.

Think about traffic flow. Place your bar close to ice and water. Place trays of finger foods on side tables and buffets throughout your entertaining area. Provide enough chairs so that at least half of your guests can be seated at a time. Position several trash cans inconspicuously near the food tables and bar to prevent precarious pileups of plates and traffic jams in the kitchen.

If you don't have time to deep clean your home the day of the party, hit the heavy traffic areas such as your living room, dining room, and bathrooms, and leave the rest for later.

Set the mood with holiday music playing in the background and lit candles sparkling throughout the house. Personalize the night with a special activity. Invite your guests to write a holiday wish in a guest book displayed on your coffee table or ask them to join you for some caroling. Little details such as these help make your party an event to remember.

Guests love party favors. Send yours home with a little something extra: a small ornament, a bag of cookies, even a candy cane with a bow is a sweet way to say happy holidays.
